BACKGROUND

THE CHALLENGE

The safety features in your car make a significant difference in the event of a crash, and may even help avoid one altogether. And yet, the most up-to-date safety features often aren't prioritised as much as they should be when people consider buying a new or used vehicle.

Since the 1970s, safety features including seatbelts and airbags have been introduced into vehicles. Since then, the advances in vehicle safety have been monumental. With safety features that keep drivers in their lane (Lane Keep Assist), electronic stability control (ESC), cruise control, auto emergency braking, rear-view cameras and more, the advancements are truly life-saving. Here are some facts and thought starters for your idea:

In 2022, 66 out of 121 drivers and passengers were killed in a vehicle more than 10 years old.

02

The average vehicle on Victoria's roads is around 10 years old - meaning far too many cars are without the latest life-saving technologies found in more modern vehicles.

03

Victorians can research and compare new and used car safety ratings on the howsafeisyourcar.com.au website.

04

Younger and older drivers are most likely to drive older, less safe vehicles with fewer safety features - it would be good to call this out specifically to your target audience.

On average, the drivers of vehicles with the lowest star rating are eight times more likely to be killed or seriously injured than the same driver in the same crash driving a 5-star rated vehicle.

When purchasing a new or used vehicle, opt for the safest vehicle you can afford.
